Causes of Syphilis Bacterial infection: Syphilis is caused by the bacterium *Treponema pallidum*. It is primarily transmitted through sexual contact with an infected person. Vertical transmission: Pregnant women with syphilis can pass the infection to their unborn child through the placenta, causing congenital syphilis. Transfusion or organ transplantation: In rare cases, syphilis can be transmitted through blood transfusion or

organ transplantation from infected donors. Direct contact: Syphilis can rarely be spread through direct contact with open sores or rashes of an infected person, typically during sexual activities.
